

The Tour de France is the world's largest annual sporting event and sees over 200 riders complete 2000 miles in just 23 days. Close to 3 billion people watch the tour on television each year, with many millions lining the route throughout. The start of the tour is celebrated with the Grand Depart, where the host city will be placed on an international stage.

Due to the tour's massive following in neighbouring counties, it often starts outside France. This year, it will be the turn of Yorkshire with the host city being Leeds. This will be the first time the Grand Depart has taken place in the UK outside of London.

The Grand Depart takes place on 5th July 2014 with the first stage departing from Leeds city centre, travelling through the Yorkshire Dales and finishing in Harrogate, while the second stage starts in York and finishes in Sheffield. The University of Leeds is supporting two of the large events, the 'Ghost Peloton', which will see riders illuminated with LED lights cycle around Yorkshire, and the 'Tour de Cinema' which will display cycling films in unusual locations throughout Yorkshire.



was delighted to be able to let you know in the last issue of FD Matters how Council had approved plans for our Capital Development Programme, and as you walk around campus you will see ample evidence of our commitment to continue to invest in the estate. Building improvements, new construction and the re-design of existing spaces may be disruptive and look unsightly for a time, but they are very visible reminders of the importance we place on continuing to invest in our facilities and buildings, to support the best possible campus experience.

As a University, we are now in a good position to think about our strategy for the future – and there is already a strong desire to set a greater ambition for research and innovation in the years ahead. Many experts already see these as crucial for the UK's prospects for economic recovery, with universities at the forefront – and while Leeds has a good record in this area, it could be even better.

With that in mind, a paper submitted to the March Council meeting outlines a plan to develop business incubation space, with a proposal to construct a new building capable of hosting new high-tech companies in their early stages. The building would provide high quality serviced offices, general laboratory and workshop space and include a café, meeting space and conference facilities.

The aim of the plan is to foster a culture of enterprise and innovation generally, and encourage high growth start-up businesses, for example graduates looking to set up a company would have easy access to dedicated facilities and the University's own expertise in enterprise and innovation. All of this is designed to create an environment where good ideas can be turned into viable businesses and the University encourages the next generation of entrepreneurs.

As the University's strategy develops, the Facilities Directorate will be instrumental in supporting it – and the Directorate's management team will develop plans to provide such support for the strategy through the coming year.

Meanwhile, you may be wondering how things are looking for student recruitment in 2014. This is a critical time of year for undergraduate applications – the deadline for applying for most courses has now passed and prospective students are considering their options. It is pleasing to note that so far there are positive signs, with the number of applications up on the same time last year. However, we also know that the student experience is critical to their final decision to choose a particular university and so our facilities continue to play a critical role.

The project is due for completion in Spring 2014 and we will keep you updated on the progress.




St Marks officially opens

Embedding Sustainability

As part of the process of embedding sustainability practice into the University we are starting to develop an ISO 14001 accredited Environmental Management System (EMS). Although we have environmental plans and objectives covering the majority of our key impact areas, we are currently lacking evidence of an auditable management system. Such evidence of this is increasingly required when the University bids for research or other funding, and with that in mind, the



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reat Food at Leeds is proud to have been awarded the 'Food for the Brain' Nutritional Accreditation for the 6th year in a row.

The Great Food at Leeds team maintained their excellent score of 82% in the annual audit which took place in February.

The team were praised for their continued enthusiasm and commitment to Food for the Brain and healthy eating options. Particular recognition was gained for the impressive focus on sustainability, seasonality and provenance of products with 45% of suppliers being within 20 miles of the University and 75% of suppliers within 60 miles.

The team were also complimented for their expanding range of gluten free products and

Thirteen volunteers from Residential Services, Accommodation Office, Leeds University Union, and Sustainability, recently spent a day 'scrub-bashing', at Ledston Luck Nature Reserve, near Leeds. Ledston Luck is a small community of some twentyodd houses, situated to the east of Leeds, near the larger villages of Micklefield, Garforth and Kippax. The hamlet is located next to the A656 from Castleford, and its straight course and location on the ridge hints at its Roman origins, providing an alternative route to Ermine Street, between Lincoln and York, further to the east.

Leeds has a strong coal mining heritage, and it is thought that the Romans may have extracted coal from the Garforth area for use in their legionary fortress at York. In the 1880s, there were 111 collieries listed in and around Leeds, predominantly in the western, southern and eastern areas of the city. Coal mining started at Garforth in 1760, and Micklefield Mine was

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certainly operational in 1880. The mine was owned by the Micklefield Coal & Lime Co Ltd, and they subsequently opened further pits nearby at Peckfield (1888), and Ledston Luck (1909).

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
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Micklefield Mine closed before World War II, and the remaining mines were taken over by Briggs Collieries Ltd in 1939. Both mines were then nationalised in 1947, with Peckfield

closing in 1980, and Ledston Luck, the last working coal mine in the Leeds area, in 1986. On closure, the steel headgear/winding towers were removed, but the Edwardian winding houses and satellite buildings all still remain with a Grade II listing, accommodating local businesses, including a cafe. The site was remediated in the early 1990s, and purchased by Leeds City Council as a nature reserve, and its management has recently been taken over by Yorkshire Wildlife Trust www.ywt.org. uk/reserves/ledston-luck. The nature reserve is home to 4,000+ bee, common spotted, and southern marsh orchids; its pond attracts emperor dragonflies, and both large red and emerald damselflies; and bird species such as yellowhammer and grasshopper warbler breed on the reserve.

The aim of the volunteering day was to help Yorkshire Wildlife Trust to clear away scrub or small trees that had encroached on the hay meadow areas of the nature reserve, and which would adversely impact on the orchid species. The volunteers used a variety of loppers and saws to remove the scrub and the cuttings were used to form a 'dead hedge' of inter-twined wood that would provide a refuge/cover for local animal and bird species. All in all, it was a really successful day, as it didn't rain; the work was done; and all present left with a smile on their face, albeit with aching bodies the following day!

Postscript: During the ownership of the mine by Briggs Collieries Ltd in the 1940s, the general manager was D.H. Currer Briggs, resident at 12 North Hill Road in Headingley (now owned by the University of Leeds), and he was also a Member of Council at The University of Leeds as well – We wonder what he would think about the transition from coal mining to sustainability, for both the colliery and the University?

The new and improved Suppliers Easter Fair 2014 (previously known as the Suppliers Exhibition) took place in the University's Sports Hall 1 (at the Edge Fitness Centre) on Tuesday 8th April.

The Suppliers Exhibition has been a successful and well attended event in the University's calendar for the past 13 years and is one of the largest events of its kind within the UK, offering a unique opportunity for staff to develop their contacts and relationships with suppliers.

This year the event had a facelift: the Suppliers Easter Fair included Fairtrade & Farmers Market style stalls giving attendees the opportunity pick up a few Easter treats while networking with existing and new suppliers.

The MEETinLEEDS team organised the event: handing out Fairtrade Choc- Affair Easter lollies to the first 200 arrivals. Catering was supplied by Great Food at Leeds, from the new Deli(very) Taste of Yorkshire Menu.



T may well be unknown to many staff but for the past 18 years the University Security Service has operated a dog section consisting of 4 Security Dog Handlers and their dogs.

They predominantly work during evenings and nights around the Halls of Residence and the section was initially set up to not only deter and prevent crime around the Halls of Residences but to act as a reassuring presence to those living in them. Their role has evolved over time and along with other officers the dog section plays an integral role in continuing to prevent and deter crime in these out-lying areas. Assisting more recently with Operation Optimal - a joint University and Police initiative - the dog staff and others have played a pivotal role in making the area around the Halls a safer place to live.

Following the death of one of the dogs

recently, the University bought not just one puppy as a replacement but three, which had been made available from a recent litter, by West Yorkshire Police. The dogs are usually bought from the West Yorkshire force, who also train our handlers every 5 weeks at their headquarters at Carr Gate in Wakefield.

The other two puppies are to replace two living dogs who are nearing their retirement age. Although university-owned the dogs are looked after by their handlers and live at the handler's home.

Malcolm Dawson, the Security Operations Manager said, "I am particularly proud to say that Leeds is the only University in the UK to have their own dog team, trained to the very highest of police standards. The dog handlers are all totally committed and dedicated to their roles and carry out their duties most professionally".



After signing up for a Tree Nursery Programme with the Earth Restoration Service/WWF, Bright Beginnings were more than happy to donate some of the native tree saplings to the campus. In an FD-collaborative effort, locations were identified on 10 campus sites where the saplings could be planted and on 14th March, Jenna Whitworth, Forest School Leader at the nursery led small groups of children to do the planting. Jenna explains: 'This activity is a great opportunity for the children to get out and see the campus, get involved in the grounds management and feel like they are making a valuable contribution to the future of the campus. They learn and gain knowledge relating to the importance of trees, practical skills of planting and nurturing growing things and helping the planet- by helping to restore green spaces'. Mike Howroyd, Sustainability Projects Co-ordinator and leader of the biodiversity work or

campus explained: 'this work supports the objectives of the Biodiversity Action Plan and is another great example of what can be achieved when the FD comes together.'


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New website for MEETinLEEDS
