The annual University of Leeds Sustainability Awards were held in June, to celebrate and recognise sustainability initiatives across campus and further afield. Sir Alan Langlands, the Vice-Chancellor presented the Sustainability Awards and highlighted this years' key achievements which included achieving ISO14001 accreditation, the launch of the Community Mentoring Scheme and work with IntoUniversity.

BUDDING FLOWERBED DESIGNERS

hree beautiful flowerbeds designed by students from IntoUniversity were officially unveiled by the Vice-Chancellor Sir Alan Langlands in July. The flower beds are the result of a collaboration between IntoUniversity, the Grounds Team and the Sustainability Service who ran a workshop and competition for year 5 and 6 school children to learn about the importance of biodiversity.

Plants in the flowerbeds increase our campus' biodiversity: they are purposefully bright and insect-friendly. Located in three prime locations on campus: each side of the Parkinson steps and on the grass area next to the Michael Sadler

building - the flowerbeds are becoming a focal feature for visitors of both human and friendly bug varieties.

IntoUniversity works with local children and young people from disadvantaged backgrounds and provides them with inspiring opportunities to raise their future aspirations. At the formal opening, Sir Alan Langlands said: "The University of Leeds encourages collaboration at all levels - that is why it was so exciting to see departments of the university work together with the local community in order to create something long-lasting and joyful for our campus."

TRAVEL SURVEY RESULTS >>>



he Sustainability Service collects data annually on how students and staff members travel to and from work to help inform the University's transport planning and measure how we are progressing against sustainable travel targets.

This year's travel survey had a fantastic response rate with over 5000 students and staff completing it. The results showed that:

- there has been an increase in staff commuting using public transport
- car sharing and walking to work have slightly increased, however staff cycling rates have fallen slightly
- staff single occupancy car use has fallen 1

• students commuting patterns have remained relatively constant with a slight increase in walking to University, slight decrease in public transport use and cycling with an increase in single occupancy car use to commute to University from 1.6 to 3%.

The travel focus for the Sustainability Service in 2016-17 will involve increasing cycling amongst staff and students. This will be achieved through a variety of ways such as introducing a new staff bike hire offer at the Bike Hub and engaging with travel suppliers to improve the public transport offer for staff and students.

- The new FD building has been designed and constructed to include features that will improve its sustainability. These include the carpet tiles that run throughout the new building which have been manufactured entirely from recycled materials and once they reach the end of their life will be fully recycled into a new carpet product.
- There are low flush toilets, movement sensors for the lights and sustainable heating and cooling systems, along with the installation of a bike shed and showers to encourage active travel.
- Where possible, such as in meeting rooms, furniture has been reused*
- Over 2000 hot drinks have been consumed since the building opened!
- Did you know 17 people can fit into a seating booth!
- The biophillic design elements of the building including planters help us all to feel connected to nature which makes us more productive and creative at work.

PROJECTS COMPLETE

With a number of masterplan projects now complete and a few more approaching completion over the coming months, it's rewarding to see the hard work of Estates colleagues coming to realisation.

The School of Fine Art, History of Art and Cultural Studies

Project completed in July 2016

The £7.6m year-long project involved a complete refurbishment of the former School of Geography site, to create a first class, inspirational learning environment for current and future students. Staff moved into the building on University Road in early August, with the building expected to be fully operational for the start of term.

Paul Cook, Project Manager, Estates Team commented: "This has been a thoroughly rewarding project. We are incredibly pleased with the significant transformation of the original building to what it has become now which is a modern environment that will enable the School to become a leading Centre for art, heritage and critical humanities and culture in the UK.

Working closely with Abigail Harrison Moore and her team throughout the project has ensured the clients' needs were catered for from start to finish."

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

School of Philosophy, Religion, History of Science and Arts



The £1m smart refurbishment of Botany House has created a new transformed space for the School of Philosophy, Religion, History of Science and Arts. This new facility provides an inspired environment for Postgraduates and teaching staff to further enhance the School's research capabilities.

The school is the only one of its kind enabling creative and critical future thinkers in higher education. The new site will provide a dedicated space for students to continue exploring philosophy, religion, and history of science in unparalleled depth and breadth.

Louise Hawksworth, School of Philosophy, Religion, History of Science and Arts Manager said: The refurbishment of Botany House is a huge step for the School of Philosophy, Religion and History of Science and Arts. It means we have been able to

rethink how we use our accommodation, including existing space in Michael Sadler and Baines Wing, to allow for improved facilities for our staff, undergraduate and postgraduate students, and visitors.

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Up until now the School has been spread out over seven buildings, but now it feels like PRHSA has a home right in the heart of campus.

Astbury Biostructure Laboratory

£17m investment in the Astbury Biostructure Laboratory was completed at the end of the August. It will allow the University to remain at the structures and their ability to modify and treat disease. The investment work has comprised of the refurbishment of rooms and space to accommodate transmission electron microscopy, scanning electron microscopy equipment and the Krios Electron Microscopes.

OUR IMPACT ON THE RIO 2016 GAMES

e are proud of the impact the University has on world class sport. Our students, staff and alumni have contributed to global sporting achievements for many years and there has been more of the same this summer in the 2016 Rio Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Triathlon stars Alistair and Jonny Brownlee confirmed their status as the sport's pre-eminent stars on the roads of Rio claiming gold and silver in a highly convincing Olympic win.

The brothers, who are both University of Leeds graduates, and who regularly train using campus facilities, performed strongly in the swim and the cycle sections of the race, before dominating the run and pulling away from the pack to complete the last two laps almost alone.

The third member of the TeamGB squad was Gordon Benson, who graduated from the University this summer with a BSc in Nutrition and was performing in his first Olympics.

Over in the pool Rebecca Gallantree competed in the 3M springboard syncro and finished in 6th position.

Our students participating in the Paralympics include Claire Cashmore, who is aiming to beat her silver medal from London and go for Gold in the 100m Breaststroke SB8.

Another silver medallist from London 2012 is Karen Darke who will be competing once again in Hand Cycling. Laura Sugar our final Alumni will be competing in the 200m T44 classification at her first ever Paralympic games after switching from Hockey just 4 years ago.

Finally our current student and Sports Scholar Kim Daybell will be flying the flag for Team GB in the Table Tennis. Kim is feeling confident going into the Paralympic Games after taking a year out from his Medicine degree to focus on Rio 2016.

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It is the culmination of 4 years of blood, sweat and tears to be named as a GB Paralympian and it is such an honour.

ine students and three staff members had the trip of a lifetime this summer, travelling to South Africa to change the lives of children who are less fortunate. The Gryphons Abroad team raised over £30k to deliver the projects in South Africa which aimed to raise aspirations through sports leadership.

One of the main projects the team delivered was teaching children how to ride bikes. The children were given their own bike and taught by our Leeds students not only how to ride it but also how to maintain it. The aim being to increase the number of children able to attend school. Having access to their own bike and having learnt the skills needed to both ride and fix the bike means that they no longer have to walk two hours to get to school.

"It was easy to see the kids grow with confidence as we worked with them"

Shona "We've had a long lasting impact, not only teaching them new skills but also teaching them how to teach others."

The project not only had an impact on the students out in South Africa but also on our students from Leeds. They have learnt how to adapt to new situations and gained a huge amount of confidence as well as developing leadership skills, working with children and also how to effectively work as part of a team.

"Being part of this team has been a life changing experience, I have gained in confidence and my leadership skills. I will look at things differently and seize every opportunity from now on!" Sophia

This project shows the great opportunity's Leeds Sport provides to ensure students have a great experience while here in Leeds as well as developing their employability skills to support their future careers.

After such a successful first year the Gryphons Abroad programme will continue next year and the team are currently recruiting students to join them in South Africa 2017.

This years Sky Ride Leeds was another great success, not only helped by the glorious weather in Leeds but also a number of staff from the Facilities Directorate.



ELCOME TO SUZANNE GLAVIN




uzanne joins us as the University's new Head of Sport, following her role at Sport England where she was the Head of Youth and Education.
