Our facilities are top five for student experience!



arlier this month it was announced that the University has moved into the top five ✓in this year's Times Higher Education Student Experience Survey, from sixth position last year, to fourth this year.

Our FD facilities, activities and societies, and services such as security on campus and sports facilities all feature particularly strongly.

Professor Tom Ward, Deputy Vice-Chancellor: Student Education, said:

"The exceptional student experience at Leeds is the result of the University's close partnership with Leeds University Union, which ensures

that students are involved at every level of university life.

"Being voted into the top five feels very encouraging, and I hope reflects the success of Leeds' unique offer to students, which combines dynamic, research-based education with a strong emphasis on extra-curricular activities.


Exceptional campus facilities

Students voted Leeds third for its facilities, including quality, convenience, library/opening hours, shop and bar amenities, and sports facilities.

With first-rate accommodation, libraries and teaching facilities, the University is investing a further £520m to developing campus to support world-leading research and teaching. This spring sees the completion of some of the most recent investments, including a £5m cycling track and the £24.7m refurbishment of the Edward Boyle Library.

Already one of the best student unions in the UK, Leeds University Union was the first union to be awarded 'excellent' status in NUS quality accreditation and will provide even better facilities and opportunities for students following the completion of a £17 million upgrade in 2017.

The Union continues to receive one of the highest levels of satisfaction amongst students.



The new Brownlee Centre and Cycle Circuit opened its doors this month to staff, students and the local community. Following a hugely successful opening day on 28 April Leeds Alum, Alastair and Jonny Brownlee alongside the VC Sir Alan Langlands officially opened the Centre. The event attracted a considerable amount of interest in the local and national media, including the leading feature on BBC Breakfast.

A mixture of activities will take place at the new facilities including triathlon and cycling and the refurbished changing facilities will be used by football, rugby and lacrosse teams playing on the sports pitches.

The cycle circuit is available for everyone to use and a number of pay and play sessions take place each week. Staff can just turn up to one of these sessions where bikes are available to

hire including a fleet of accessible bikes.

The Brownlee Centre is the UK's first purpose built triathlon training centre and sits alongside a new 1 mile (1.6km) cycle circuit – one of the longest in the country – at the University's Bodington playing fields in north Leeds.

The site has benefited from 420 new trees which were secured by the Sustainability team through The Woodland Trust and planted by volunteers prior to the facility opening.

Drainage from the site is being managed by a large balancing pond which is the first wetland on the University of Leeds estate, aside from the Roger Stevens Pond and is a great biodiversity addition and ecological feature.

A bridge has been installed over the cycle circuit which has been re-purposed from the London 2012 Olympic Games. This bridge will allow users of the grass pitches easy access to these across the cycle circuit.

STAFF VOLUNTEERS HAVE PLANTED 600 TREES WITH YORKSHIRE WILDLIFE TRUST



ur student and staff volunteers have been busy planting trees in partnership with Yorkshire Wildlife Trust (YWT), at Water Haigh near Woodlesford in February, and Willow coppicing at Esholt near Raydon in March

Water Haigh is the site of a Woodland Park owned by Leeds City Council, and is managed by YWT on their behalf. The volunteers helped to plant over 600 trees on a former colliery site that closed in 1970. The trees will help to soak up ground water, and assist in the storage of water in lower ground levels, thereby reducing surface run-off. The trees will also help attract insects and birds with food and cover, thereby improving the biodiversity of the nature reserve.

The site at Esholt is owned by Yorkshire Water, but they allow YWT to coppice willow for subsequent use on riverbank protection schemes on the Upper Aire Valley, near Bradford, Leeds, and Skipton.

The volunteers coppiced the three year old willow, and cut it to manageable lengths, for subsequent use as vertical posts, or grouped in bundles for use as fascines. The posts will eventually be driven in to the base of river banks in two parallel rows, and the fascines are then dropped horizontally between the posts, with soil back-filled thereafter. The cut willow then takes root in the bottom of the riverbank, reducing soil erosion, and will also sprout leaves and stems the following year, providing further cover for wildlife along the river.



TRAINING FD STAFF TO HELP PEOPLE WITH COMMUNICATIONS DIFFICULTIES

embers of staff from Residential Services, Catering Services and Conferencing have recently undertaken expert training with Communication Access UK (CAUK) to help them improve the way they assist people with communications difficulties. The sessions were a national pilot on augmented and alternative communication delivered to 66 colleagues.

For our staff, this training means that we

can assist people with communication difficulties and provide them with an equal and inclusive environment in which to live and work, here at the University of Leeds.

The Communication Access UK (CAUK) project aims to support people who have little or no clear speech and who may use other communication methods to get their message across. CAUK intends to train businesses to become more accessible for people with communication difficulties, and

has the support of the Royal College of Speech & Language Therapists, The Stroke Association, and other partners.

The University's Equality and Inclusion Strategy includes "ensuring a world class student experience through inclusion and academic excellence" and "recognising the range of needs of our diverse student population and integrating these into the governance and practice of student education".



When we surveyed you last Christmas to ask your views about this newsletter, many of you said that you'd like to know more about the teams in the FD, who they are and what they do. We took this idea on board and for this edition we'd like to introduce the Grounds and Gardens Team and Security Services Team.



Tell us about the work your team does.

There are 16 of us in total and between us we work across campus, Bardon Grange nursery and Sports Park Weetwood.

We manage the tree stock on all sites, which includes over 1000 trees on campus.

We look after over 30 Hectares of sports fields and synthetic surfaces, including a newly resurfaced 3G Desso iDNAx pitch at Sports Park Weetwood, it is compliant to FIFA and IRB regulations and is similar to the pitches that Leeds Rhinos, Manchester United, Chelsea and Manchester City all have.

We will apply 440 tonnes of sand to the winter games pitches during renovations, as well as 3000kg of ryegrass seed and 4000kg fertiliser.

We plant over 5000 polyanthus, and 2500 bellis on campus as the spring bedding displays. Along with planting over 7000 geraniums and 3000 begonia in the summer displays.

We will grow 400 poinsettias from plugs, at Bardon Grange, for the winter degree ceremonies.

£400K of equipment is used to manage and maintain the University's estate.

What do you all like to do outside of work?

Between them, the team in their spare time like playing snooker, watching Leeds Utd and spending time with family. Going to the horse racing, playing football, bowling, socialising with friends and making an album with the Bondurant's band, a Leeds based alternative country band.

With the arrival of Spring, what are your top gardening tips for us?

Give the garden a general tidy up, remove dead leaves, cut back grasses and herbaceous plants.

Install a water butt to keep the plants healthy in the tropical summer months ahead! Make sure the mower is serviced and sharpened to avoid any breakdowns in the mowing season.

What is the most fun or memorable project that the team has worked on?

Preparing the rugby pitch at Sports Park Weetwood for the Scotland Rugby World Cup training camp and turning the pitches around during the 2016 renovations. The University winning Yorkshire in Bloom gold medal in 2007. Working with local school children designing the sustainable flower beds. Taking delivery of our new shiny, 50 horse-power Kubota tractor!

SECURITY SERVICES

Tell us about the work your team does



The security service mission statement is to ensure that the University is a safe and secure environment for all students, staff and visitors, both on and off campus. Student service and supporting the University is at the forefront of what we do and continue to do. Our mission remains as strong as ever!

The team led by Malcolm Dawson, Security Services Manager, is made up of four teams of full time University of Leeds Security staff, with a mix of agency staff, to assist the security operation, as well as a dedicated Crime Prevention Adviser, Car Park and Administrative staff, and a Police Higher Education Liaison Officer. We also have dog handlers attached within the teams.

Security staff patrol the whole 98 acre campus site on foot and mobile patrol, and also all the off-campus Halls of Residences.

We spend most of the 12 hours on shift patrolling around campus, giving a reassuring presence to staff and students, and to deter and prevent any crime.

Andrew Gordon-Platt, Crime Prevention Adviser, last year delivered over 30 talks to nearly 3500 students on safety and security We work in close partnership with West Yorkshire Police, particularly with PC Guy, our University Police Higher Education Officer, who is soon moving to pastures new within West Yorkshire Police.

We spend most of the 12 hours on shift patrolling around campus, giving a reassuring presence to staff and students, and to deter and prevent any crime.

We have four security vehicles and a dog van, all appropriately marked and liveried.

Four security staff have recently been awarded Police Commendations, one for Bravery and 3 for Excellent Security work. Two of our officers also won the overall Spotlight Awards, organised by Commercial and Campus Support Services.

What are the best things about your job?

The rewarding feeling when all those hours, days and weeks of being patient during training all comes together. Working with colleagues who are now best friends. Creating a great bond with my security dog, where we can work with each other in sometimes difficult situations.

What do you like to outside of work?

The team keep busy in their spare time by keeping fit, seeing live band performances, enjoying holidays abroad and angling.

CAMPUS DEVELOPMENTS UPDATE

Our largest schemes are now under way this year, Engineering and Physical Sciences and NEXUS, as part of the £520m campus development programme.

Work has commenced for Engineering and Physical Sciences

programme of work commenced in March to prepare for the £96m investment to create an integrated campus for Engineering and Physical Sciences. Staff, students and visitors are advised to plan their route as site hoardings are now being installed and access routes to and from Engineering will change.

The new development will bring together research and teaching across Engineering and Physical Sciences, to inspire new ways of working across disciplines, strengthen industry collaboration and support world-class student education.



To include new homes for the Schools of Computing and Physics & Astronomy, this investment will also provide specialised teaching spaces and will be the hub for our new Bragg Centre, providing facilities and expertise to support multidisciplinary materials research involving physicists, chemists, biologists and engineers.

Phase one of the project will see the demolition of the former Estates Building and the Old Boiler House.

Our buildings are Architectural awards winners

hree of our building projects were highly commended for their architectural prowess at the 26th Leeds architecture awards and signify the ongoing hard work and commitment of colleagues within Estate Services.



The installation of the untitled Bas-Relief sculpture on the side of the Stage@Leeds was highly commended in the public realm and landscape design category. Bodington Hall's architects, Jones and Stocks, subcontracted Hubert Dalwood to create the frieze for the hall's refectory block in 1961. The sculpture was saved and moved to Stage@Leeds and refurbished in spring 2016.

The Laidlaw Library received a commendation in the New Building Category.

The multi-storey car park was highly commended in the Young People's Review category.

Inspiring new environment in Worsley

The major investment programme to improve the Worsley building completed at the start of this year within the stated schedule of 15 months.

The significant improvements benefitting staff and students of the School of Medicine encompassed the refurbishment of teaching spaces to create dynamic learning environments, the refurbishment of levels 8 to 11 within the building creating modern office accommodation for Clinical Trials Research Unit, Leeds Institute for Health Sciences and faculty offices. A modernised and more welcoming entrance way off Clarendon Road, a new café and a landscaped garden on Level 9. Over £10m has been invested in replacing outdated building services and plant alongside the internal fit out.

Following on from this a further investment of £5m is now underway on Level 6 in the School of Dentistry.



Edward Boyle Library now fully open

Il levels of the Edward Boyle Library have fully opened to students and staff. With all six floors now open, the library offers 2000 study spaces and is already proving popular for exam revision. The Edit Room café provides a place for a welcome break.



Making our Central Teaching Spaces even better!

e will be investing a further £2m into our Central Teaching Spaces this summer. 19 lecture theatres and seminar rooms within the Roger Stevens, Chemistry and Michael Sadler buildings will undergo refurbishment to create modernised and inspiring places for our students to be taught in. The work will include the replacement of AV & IT equipment, as well as a general refresh of the spaces.

Exciting plans for the expansion of School of Earth and Environment

his £7.5m investment will ensure that the School remains at the forefront of research. The expansion will also create a new collaborative space for the Priestley International Centre for Climate and will mark the establishment of both the Priestley Centre research platform and a Met Office Joint Research Unit – which will realise the Priestley Centre mission to promote interdisciplinary climate-solutions research of the highest standard.

FD Green Impact Teams


The Facilities Directorate Building Green Impact Team have been busy working through the workbooks as part of their submission this year, with the aim of achieving a Gold award.

University of Leeds achieves ISO 14001: 2015 accreditation

arlier this month we celebrated achieving the accreditation to the new ISO14001: 2015 standard following a successful external audit by AJA Registrars.

The accreditation system assesses our Environmental Management System, which is at the heart of embedding sustainability, at the University. It offers a systematic and transparent way of managing environmental objectives and targets, reducing the impacts and supporting compliance against environmental legislation.

This is a huge accomplishment as it covers all activities within the University campus, including the University residential portfolio and University sports and conferencing facilities. Achieving the 2015 standard further demonstrates the commitment and leadership for sustainability which exists at the University.

On receiving the accreditation, Director of Sustainability Services, Dr Louise Ellis says: "This is an amazing achievement and is a huge step for the University to achieve

accreditation to the new standard across such a large and diverse organisation."


FD COMMITTED TO EQUALITY AND INCLUSION NEW TRANS EQUALITY POLICY UNVEILED


