Gold for Leeds in Teaching Excellence Framework

In June, the Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE) published the Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) ratings and Leeds was awarded Gold.

This means that the independent TEF panel judged that we deliver "consistently outstanding teaching, learning and outcomes for our students, of the highest quality found in the UK".

The assessment cited that "students from all backgrounds achieve consistently outstanding outcomes" and that the University has a "creative approach to supporting students in their independent learning".

Professor Tom Ward, Deputy-Vice-Chancellor: Student Education said: "This Gold rating strengthens our excellent reputation in student education and experience, but of course, we will always strive to improve further and we must maintain a relentless focus on educational excellence. Preparations are already underway to map out how the TEF measures may be useful in informing and enhancing student education in the future.

"The TEF is just one of the measures used to assess our strengths as a University - our 90% satisfaction rate in the National Student Survey last year and top five position in the Times Higher Education Student Experience Survey 2017 are other important measures, and our position as The Times and The Sunday Times University of the Year in 2017.

"It's important that we continue to showcase our distinctiveness and strengths in all the

information that is available to prospective students in their decision-making process, including our very successful Open Days.

"We can all be proud of this result, which is testament to the hard work, commitment and talents of not only our staff, but also students across the University. Indeed, the judges cited our 'embedded ethos of the Leeds partnership with students' as one of our strengths. I'd like to thank Leeds University Union, which also contributed to the submission, along with our student education team, our inspirational teachers and personal tutors, and everyone who has played a part in earning us this recognition."

Sensory Garden at Charles Morris Hall

Storm Jameson Court is designed and accredited as 'Access Exceptional' by the Visit Britain National Accessible Scheme. However, whilst the site is home to student and conference wheelchair users, the grounds previously housed fairly simple shrub planting, with little opportunity for engagement.

The Residences Team have set up a wheelchair accessible sensory garden, focussed on people assessed on the autism spectrum (ASD). The planting scheme will have year-round interest, and is based on advice received from Buglife's Urban Buzz scheme in York, and the RHS Perfect for Pollinators Plant List.

The primary objective of the sensory garden is to improve access to the garden at Charles Morris Hall, thereby ensuring equal access and inclusiveness for all students, staff and visitors.

Additional objectives are to promote the

well-being of students and visitors with ASD, with the planting scheme prioritised on known benefits. Also to increase biodiversity, by attracting invertebrates through the planting of species on the RHS Pollinator List. The year-round interest will assist invertebrates, especially the local Tawny Mining Bees located here on campus, and also the bees that live in hives on top of the Laidlaw Library.

Additionally, the team are working with the RNIB to highlight the planting of varying textures and to produce supporting guides, delivering tactile and large print versions of hand-held guides which detail what is there to



Our largest schemes are now under way, Engineering and Physical Sciences and NEXUS, as part of the £520m campus development programme

Our transformed lecture theatres success!



Tt's official, there has been a significant improvement in user experience amongst our students following the innovative transformation of three lecture theatres last

The £2.8m innovative, sector leading redesign of Dental LT, Mechanical Engineering LT B and Roger Stevens LT 8 completed last summer allowing for a full year of teaching to be delivered this year. The scores above 80% for each of these areas. work undertaken saw the physical redevelopment of the lecture theatre spaces to allow group discussion alongside the use of installed technology for group work, interaction, communication and recording.

Students were surveyed before and after the transformation with regards to how satisfied they were with the lecture theatres, how comfortable they found the writing surfaces, how conducive the room was for group study, how satisfied they were with AV and IT provision and how well the lecture theatre lends itself to group work. The fantastic results showed our students love the facilities, with overwhelming satisfaction

Some students feedback comments included: "great for group work", "it is much better and comfier", "We need more lecture theatres like this"

Professor Neil Morris, Director of Digital

Learning at the University commented: "Through the transformation of our spaces we have been able to establish the strong pedagogy that we were trying to achieve. The collaborative spaces, with desk based technology which is innovative, enables students to work collaboratively through digital means and enriches their learning

This first year we have seen a number of the staff undertake the type of teaching they've wanted to do for many years but haven't been able to because of the configuration of the space. The impact is huge for teachers as they are actually able to do the teaching that they want to do and from that comes the positive student satisfaction figures that we've seen

Disruptions

With any building project, disruptions are inevitable. Two significant disruptions that are being managed by the Estates team are taking place over the next few months.

Comprehensive consultation and communications with key stakeholders, staff and students by the Project Managers has been completed. Full details are below:

Temporary Closure of Cromer Terrace Monday 2 October to Wednesday 10 January 2018

Essential cabling works will take place along Cromer Terrace in order to lay new infrastructure for the University and strengthen the University power capabilities

During this time, access to Cromer Terrace will be restricted and vehicle diversions will be in place to redirect traffic away and around Cromer Terrace during the works.

Temporary Closure of Vernon Road Monday 23 October to Monday 4 December

Essential work will take place on Vernon Road to extend the heating from The Edge to the new Nexus building. Travelling from the North of the City will involve taking a slightly longer route as access will be diverted via Calverley St and Willow Terrace Road entrance, over the Inner Ring Road bridge.

From 4pm, an alternative route will be opened to traffic to allow traffic to exit north via Woodhouse Lane - NB this route will only be open after 4pm. Pedestrian access will remain open throughout the works.

Another major part of the exciting new development is the introduction of a brand new Virtual Class offer, with Studio 1 at The Edge undergoing a £10k investment turning it into an enhanced training space with a wide range of digitally led exercise classes in addition to the usual instructor led sessions.

tasks and will hold information related to jobs such as health and safety data and labour

There will be approximately 50 users of the system in the first rollout. They will be members of staff based in Estates, more specifically in Maintenance and Operations.

Leeds Sport staff and students were highly rewarded at the inaugural Yorkshire University Sports Awards. Designed to celebrate the success of sporting departments across the region, the evening was made up of six award categories of which Leeds Sport were shortlisted in an impressive five

Women's hockey received another trophy to add to their shelf this year, winning their category primarily due to their fantastic fundraising efforts this year and giving back to the local community.

In June Sport & Physical Activity's Gryphons Aboard team travelled to ■ South Africa to deliver a life changing sport and education programme to over a 120 primary school children. The Gryphons Abroad programme began in 2016, as a partnership between the university and a local charity called the Bambisanani Partnership and the 2017 team consisted of three staff members and nine university students from a variety of different degree programmes and years of study, from first

year undergraduates to postgraduates.

The aim of Gryphon's Abroad is: "To develop and deliver an innovative and sustainable student led programme that inspires and motivates change in young people and communities both in Leeds and South Africa through learning and leadership"

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Over two weeks the programme delivered two key projects;

Cycle to Success; teaching 22 primary school children to ride and maintain bikes, overcoming the barrier of the sometimes two hour, each way commute they have to school. Here some of the children had never even ridden a bike before and the Gryphons Abroad team left in the knowledge they had delivered a set of life changing skills, giving the South African students a huge boost in fidence, especially for the female student who would not usually be given this opportunity in the culture they live in.

Inspire through Sport; the University of Leeds students planned and delivered four days of sports, leadership and classroom sessions to over 100 children from four local primary schools. The South African students developed a range of skills throughout the week, increasing their confidence to lead on activities back in their own schools after the Leeds team had left. For example a number of students have now set up their own football and netball clubs for other students

A final part of the project was a visit to a local orphanage, supplying some key resources such as clothing and books as well as supplying funding to ensure the children have food for up to six weeks.

In the lead up to the 2017 trip the team raised over £26,000 to support project costs through various fundraising activities, £2000 of this money came from the Commercial and Campus Support Services Sustainability Steering Group buying six bikes with equipment and donating food and clothing to the orphanage.

The project is now entering its third year and plans are already in place to develop it further; taking a larger team of university students over and expanding the programme to teach an even greater number of South African children.

Tell us a bit about your background, how long have you worked for West Yorkshire Police?

I have been a police officer for over 14 years, working in east Leeds. I have mostly been a patrol officer going to 'blue light jobs' but I have also worked within the tutor unit (looking after new police officers), neighbourhood policing team in Wetherby and as a crime investigator.

What attracted you to this role of **Police Liaison Officer at the University?**

The University is a small town and as such requires a policing presence, but it is also unique in that it is supplying the country with with a safe and secure working environment is essential. They need to be able to know that they have help and support on campus so that worked with the general public for some time now and I feel I have the skill set to help and support both students and staff alike.

Can you tell us a bit more about your role here at the University, what does being a Police Liaison Officer mean?

I am based on campus at the Universities security office and \bar{I} am here to help in any situation. Along with investigating crimes that happen on campus with the assistance of the security team I can also give help, advice and support to staff and students with regard all manner of issues. I am always happy to meet anyone to talk about any issue letting them know the probable lines of investigation, allowing them to be fully informed when deciding if they would like police assistance or if they would like the university assistance in the matter.

Through your work, how will you help students and staff stay safe during their time at the University?

I will be giving induction talks on safety both on and off campus to the new students in September, I have a twitter account that I use to pass out safety information to students and staff and I will be working closely with LUU throughout the year to ensure the message of safety to students isn't lost on a variety of subjects. If there are any specific concerns of high importance to staff or students then I will work with the media team on campus to ensure everyone is aware.


