The team collaborated with colleagues in Mechanical Engineering to design the prop which keeps bin lids securely open, allowing an easier and safer way to dispose of waste bags.

Team Healthy Week (Emma Mckenzie-Hogg, James Buckley, Leigh Marklew and Tilly Hall) received a special commendation in the Wellbeing Achievement Award for leading on the hugely successful Staff Healthy Week campaign this year. They worked with colleagues across the University to deliver the most successful Healthy Week campaign and concept to date, engaging hundreds of staff to become Healthy Week Heroes, and hundreds more staff to make a step towards improving their health and wellbeing at work.

The winners in the Wellbeing Achievement Award category were the Alumni and Development department who had 100% participation in Healthy Week, thanks to their fantastic Healthy Week Hero, Ben. This shows the direct impact of the work done by the Healthy Week Team to engage Healthy Week Heroes across campus.

A number of individuals were also nominated for awards. Jess Mayho from SPA received two nominations in the Wellbeing Achievement Award category for her fantastic work going the extra mile by being a Healthy Week Hero, and encouraging staff, who are based off campus, to be engaged in Healthy Week.

Fran Andralojc, also from SPA, was nominated for her work leading the Lifestyle and

Wellbeing Programme. Fran has supported over 50 students and a number of staff members to improve their health and wellbeing through a bespoke approach, including exercise programmes and guidance on diet, sleep, stress and other lifestyle factors.

Investors in People for the FD

e're pleased to announce that the Facilities Directorate as a whole has received Investors in People standard. This is a prestigious national standard, which recognises the importance of people in delivering high level organisational performance.

During October, the FD underwent reassessment against the Investors in People (IiP) Standard, and over the course of two weeks, the external assessor, Andrew Walsh interviewed staff from across the service, as well as attending staff meetings and carrying out workplace observations. Following this thorough audit, the assessor confirmed that the FD had been reaccredited against the level 6 standard, and that we should continue to be recognised as an Investor in People organisation.

The assessor found that staff felt there was a good level of trust at all levels and that they were supported by their managers. Overall, the FD is seen as a great place to work and there is a strong sense of enthusiasm for the future.

The standard is about continuous improvement – so whilst the FD meets the Investors in People standard, the senior management team will look

to build on the assessor's findings and recommendations, with a view to us achieving higher levels of performance in the future.

s we head towards the Christmas break and the end of another Lincredibly busy term, we can reflect on another excellent year for recruiting highquality students from the UK and around the world. esidential Services has successfully implemented a new electronic Administration system to help improve the student experience. The new system will act as an admin and student portal system, to improve service levels and student communication.

StarRez has been rolled out across all University of Leeds owned and managed sites since Summer 2017, following its

introduction to the Accommodation Office in 2016. This has increased efficiency when dealing with room allocations, contracts, property inspections and mail tracking. It has also streamlined the communication process with our residents.

The benefit to students is that they can now access a fully integrated, easy-to-use online portal 24-hours a day!

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A nother group of the battery hens) saved from slaughter have gone to reside at Devonshire nother group of lucky ex-bats (ex battery hens) saved from slaughter Hall. The 20 hens were re-homed by the British Hen Welfare Trust, a charity which has to date saved more than 600,000, and the chickens have since gone on to enjoy lots of TLC, food and fresh air and have become part of daily life for students living at the Hall.

'Project Chicken' began in July 2015 when the University adopted its first batch of ex-bats. Staff said there had been a real buzz around the scheme, with some students even popping back during their holidays to visit 'the girls'. Colin Sykes, Senior Residence Service Supervisor, said: "We decided to use rescue hens as we thought we could provide a welcome retirement from their previous environment.

"The new group seem to have settled in well; they are spreading about and finding their own way. I still think they are getting used to the chicken coop, as our night guys tell me some are still out way past their bed time!"

The spoilt hens are living in a large run with trees, a shelter for hiding from the rain, timber walkways on the perimeter fence which they

Colin continued: "The students seem to enjoy the experience; some have had chickens at home and wish to continue looking after hens, but most are new to the experience. 

taff Sustainability Architects are ambassadors for embedding sustainability throughout the organisation, and are provided with opportunities and resources to promote and implement positive change within their departments. The role is instrumental in the delivery of the University's Sustainability Strategy, in promoting positive environmental, social and economic change, and in sharing best practice. Collaborating with Architects from other teams, and providing key links between their departments and the Sustainability Service, Sustainability Architects are an exemplar in the higher education sector.

The network of Sustainability Architects is made up of people who are committed to delivering the University Sustainability Strategy across their teams. Staff Architects engage proactively with others in their School or Service. They commit at least one day a month (c0.5% FTE) to sustainability initiatives that address social, economic and environmental impacts in their department's activities.

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Staff Sustainability Architects are ambassadors for embedding sustainability throughout the organisation, and are provided with opportunities and resources to promote and implement positive change within their departments. The role is instrumental in the delivery of the University's Sustainability Strategy, in promoting positive environmental, social and economic change, and in sharing best practice.

GFAL and Sustainability work together on new enterprises

In order to support and set an example of sustainability on campus, Great Food at Leeds have launched a whole new range of reusable KeepCups, along with a new initiative aimed at combatting food waste, the Too Good To Go app.

Reusable cups have previously been stocked in GFAL outlets, but these have been revamped and rebranded this year with the University's logo and are now available in nine different colours, in addition to a premium glass 'long play' cup. A KeepCup is made from the equivalent amount of plastic as 20 disposable cup lids, and breaks even after just 15 uses, compared to a disposable cup. Using a KeepCup will save you 10p each time you use it in a GFAL outlet, and your first drink is free!





Since the start of term over 400 KeepCups have been sold, over 100 long play cups and over 70 reusable University water bottles!

'Too Good To Go' has been launched in The Business School cafe and The Refectory, and will help reduce food waste, a key aim of the University. The app offers a limited availability of surplus food portions in each location, which staff and students can order and purchase for only £2.50. Food offered ranges from salads, sandwiches, jacket potatoes and daily hot specials.

High speed rail

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he University are developing an offsite technology campus, creating an innovative, collaborative space for our world-leading interdisciplinary researchers in infrastructure materials, high speed railways, structural dynamics and robotics.

Our new centre for innovation and enterprise and will be the home for the £10M Institute for High Speed Rail.

Business School growth

he Business School is growing and has requirements to further advance the delivery of world-class teaching. The two new Leeds University Business School buildings will provide technology-rich, flexible teaching spaces, lecture theatres and trading rooms. Work is due to begin in February 2018, with a completion date of August 2020 for the whole project.



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Faculty of Biological Sciences

The Faculty of Biological Sciences has a requirement for additional good quality research space for existing research staff and new recruits to grow research income. In order to accommodate the additional headcount, we are developing a £4.6M modular building to increase the space for the Faculty.

Enabling works are currently taking place, with a view to project completion in April 2018.

New cohort selected for Gryphons Abroad

ollowing a successful fresher's week recruitment campaign for Gryphons Abroad 2018, SPA now have 11 students signed up for the trip to South Africa next year, the largest group selected to date. This is the first time that all places on the trip have been filled. The students are from a variety of different degree programmes and years of study, from first year undergraduates to postgraduates.

The project will once again focus on delivering a life-changing sport and education programme this year to a massive 150+ primary school children, at least 50 more than the previous year.

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The University will also collaborate with Leeds Trinity University, who will join the University's trip. Four Trinity students will join the University student group delivering sport and education, while three Trinity students studying teaching will go into local schools in the area to teach. This is a new element to the project, which will add even more value to the work we do in this deprived area.

These exciting new developments to the project are sure to make it yet another hugely successful year.

Half of staff and students regularly active

Arlier this year, SPA undertook an activity d and wellbeing survey (Balancing Life), to gain insight into the current activity levels of staff and students at the University, while also considering their wellbeing. This insight was very well received by University Council, who requested it becomes an annual survey.

1764 people completed the survey from across the University (719 staff and 1045 students), and the results showed that 51% of staff and students are regularly taking part in exercise with 60% of this activity taking place on campus.

Our staff are 17% more active than the average working population which is great news, however our students are 2% less active than the average higher education population, something that SPA want to improve.

Suzanne Glavin, Head of SPA said about the results: "It's great to see that just over half of our staff and students are regularly active and we want this trend to continue, however our real focus is the other 49%, and how we can work with faculties and services to build

activity into everyone's day on campus"

The insights from the Balancing Life Survey are already having a positive impact across campus, where the Student Education Service are recruiting two staff wellbeing project officers. These new posts will design and lead initiatives, based on the results of the survey, to improve staff wellbeing and to build a culture of healthy work-life balance in the Student Education Service.

The Health and Fitness team in SPA have also been working with staff and students across the university on an exciting new Lifestyle and Wellbeing Programme. Seven faculties and 50 students (through the Student Counselling Service) have now accessed this programme, which includes bespoke physical activity interventions, exercise programmes and tailored guidance on diet, sleep stress and other lifestyle factors, to support people in balancing their mental and physical health.
